Opening of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church

1856 9 Aug

On Sunday last two sermons were preached in the new Presbyterian Church, Hanover Street, by the Revd: Dr. Hetherington, D.D. of Edinburgh on the occasion of the opening of the Church for divine worship.

The erections and fittings cost the sum of £3,200, £2,000 of which had been previously subscribed, leaving the debt of 1,200. The collections on Sunday amounted to about £105, which would still further reduce the debt.

On Monday evening a Tea Meeting to commemorate the opening of the Church was held in the Cutlers' Hall, under the presidency of his worship, the Mayor. The attendance was very good, consisting chiefly of ladies and after tea the meeting was opened with prayer by the Revd. J. Steel from Manchester; after which the Mayor said the meeting had been called to commemorate the opening of the new Presbyterian Church which had recently been erected in Sheffield. The architecture of the building was an ornament to the town, and he trusted that it would not only be an ornament but a building of great use in spiritual matters. He then gave a very interesting description of a visit to Scotland and stated that from what he saw there and experienced held all Scotsmen in high respect.

After a few words from the Revd: J. Breakey, the Revd: C. Larom addressed the meeting. He gave a high and eulogistic description of Scotland and Scotsmen, aid by his personal narrations greatly interested the audience.

The Revd: J. H. Nuir next addressed the meeting. He congratulated the Presbyterians on what they had done. The structure which had been raised would be an ornament to the locality in which it stood, and he had little doubt that great good would be done by it. He had however a complaint to make against them. This morning he had received a circular from the minister of the place, Mr. Breakey, requesting him to announce the opening services of his church yesterday morning. He immediately remembered that his reverend friend was an Irishman ( laughter) and a warm hearted Irishman too, but he

could not imagine any one to be so Irish as to suppose that that he must be prepared to announce certain things on a Sabbath which he could not know till Monday. He then passed a flattering eulogism on the many virtues of his worship the Mayor, and spoke in high terms of the true catholic spirit which he was ready on all occasions to manifest.

The meeting was afterwards addressed by the Revd: J. F. Witty, the Revd: J. B. Paton, the Revd: Mr. Steele and the Revd: W. Hetherington, after which a vote of thanks was unanimously accorded to the Chairman, and the meeting broke up.
